DR. JONGWOO HAN

President

Dr. Han is the President of the Korean War Legacy Foundation and World History Digital Education Foundation. His major research and publication areas include networked information technology and its impact on social capital, elections, politics, and democracy as well as the relations between North Korea and the United States. He also constructed the Korean War Veterans Digital Memorial (KWVDM, www.kwvdm.org) and led the incorporation of the Korean War Legacy Foundation. He is an associate member of Korean War Veterans Association and the Korean War Veterans Central New York Chapter #105. He has published several books including, Networked Information Technologies, Elections, and Politics: Korea and the United States (The Lexington Books, 2011), Understanding North Korea (The Lexington Books, 2014), and Power, Place, and State-Society Relations in Korea: Neo-Confucian and Geomantic Reconstruction of the Developmental State and Democratization (The Lexington Books, 2014). His involvement in the academic exchange program with the Kim Chaek University of Technology (KUT), DPRK, since 2002, has produced many noticeable academic achievements including KUT's first digital library in 2005. Dr. Han served as the host of New York Radio Korea from 2008 - 2009 and regularly returns as a guest on this weekly talk radio program about U.S. politics and Korea. Dr. Han earned a Ph.D. in political science from Syracuse University in 1997.



JOSEPH KARB

Executive Director

Joe Karb has taught middle school Social Studies in Springville, N.Y. for 23 years. He was selected as the National Council for the Social Studies Outstanding Middle School teacher in 2012. Serving as both a C-SPAN Fellow and C-SPAN Senior Fellow, Joe developed a number of civic education initiatives at the cable network. Working extensively with national social studies standards, Joe served as an inquiry writer on the New York State C3 Toolkit. He also served on the Board of Directors of the National Council for the Social Studies for six years. Since 2016, Joe has served as the Executive Director of the Korean War Legacy Foundation, leading the development of the KWLF website, curriculum books, teacher workshops, and the veterans' archive. His work has been featured nationally through several different media outlets.



DR. BOBBIE DOWNS

Conference Director

Dr. Bobbie Downs is currently the Director of the Educational Services Unit (ESU) for Burlington County Special Services School District. Dr. Downs decided to pursue a career in education after serving as a teacher and administrator in a school for Sudanese refugees in Cairo, Egypt. Dr. Downs received her Bachelor's degree in Political Science and Master's Degree in Teaching from Drew University. Later, Dr. Downs earned her Master's degree in School Leadership and her Doctoral degree in Educational Leadership from Rowan University. Dr. Downs also holds a Graduate Certificate of Autism Education. She is a certified mindfulness instructor for Mindful Schools and an instructor for Youth Mental Health First Aid. Dr. Downs is an active member of the New Jersey Principals and Supervisors Association and the Council for Exceptional Children. She currently resides in Toms River, New Jersey.



DR. SHANNON PUGH

Curriculum Writer

Gabe earned a B.A. in Historical Studies from the University of Texas at Dallas in 1996 and an M.S. in Modern European History from the University of North Texas in 2006. He is currently the Social Studies Department Chair and Instructional Coach, College Board® Academy Assembly Delegate, and head Academic Decathlon coach for Frisco Heritage High School and serves as the lead GT Humanities Teachers for Frisco Independent School District. Gabe held the position of Coordinator of Gifted and Talented for Plano Independent School District from 2007–2009. He has also served as a College Board® Consultant, Reader, Table Leader, Sample Selector, and now Question Leader for the AP World History exam, and developed curriculum and assessment materials for the College Board, ETS (Educational Testing Service), the popular AP prep website Learnerator (now known as Albert.io), and USA Test Prep. Gabe currently teaches GT Humanities, a two-year English I and AP® World History course at Heritage High School in Frisco, Texas. He currently resides in McKinney, Texas, teaching and raising his two children, daughter aged 14 and son aged 10, with his wife of almost 20 years.



SPEAKERS



YONAH MARTIN

Senator

The Honourable Yonah Martin is a Senator of Canada, appointed by The Right Honourable Stephen Harper in 2009. She is the first Canadian of Korean descent to serve in the Senate of Canada and the first Korean-Canadian parliamentarian in Canadian history. She is currently the Deputy Leader of the Opposition in the Senate (since November 2015); and previously served as the Deputy Leader of the Government (2013-2015), and as Deputy Whip of the Government (2011-2013). Several notable achievements in Canada's Parliament include the enactment of her Bill (Korean War Veterans Day Act) and unanimous adoption of her motion to recognize June as Deaf-blind Awareness Month (June 2013); the successful multi-year campaign to acquire GST/HST exemption for Traditional Chinese Medicine practitioners and Acupuncturists (April 2014); and her intimate role in the negotiation, conclusion, ratification and implementation of the historic Canada Korea Free Trade Agreement (2009-2015). She is Co-Chair of Canada Korea Interparliamentary Group (since 2009); founding Co-Chair of Canada Bulgaria Parliamentary Group (since 2014); and Vice-Chair or Director of several other bilateral parliamentary associations and groups. Born in Seoul, South Korea, Yonah Martin immigrated to Canada in 1972, and has resided in Metro-Vancouver ever since. She earned a Bachelor of Education in 1987 from University of British Columbia and enjoyed a 21-year teaching career (1987-2008) until her appointment to the Senate. She earned a Master of Education in Curriculum and Instruction in 1996. Martin later co-founded C3 Korean Canadian Society (in 2003) and currently serves as Honorary Patron of C3. She is also the Grand Patron of Korea Veterans Association Heritage Unit (since 2017), and serves on several regional and national boards and advisory councils. Passionate about youth and young adults, she has served on the Advisory Board of Sauder's Executive Mentorship Program (since 2009); established a Parliamentary Internship program in 2011; and supports many youth and young adult organizations and initiatives. She has been married to Doug Martin since 1990; and they are proud parents of Kiana Mi-Sun Martin, a molecular biologist and artist.



DR. KATHRYN WEATHERSBY

Scholar

Dr. Kathryn Weathersby is Adjunct Professor of Asian Studies at American University in Washington, D.C., and Deputy Director of the Korean War Archive at Korea University in Seoul. She holds a Ph.D. in Modern Russian history, with a second field in Modern East Asia, from Indiana University. Following the collapse of communist rule in the Soviet Union, she did pioneering research in Russian archives on the creation of the North Korean state and the Korean War, and has published and lectured widely on these subjects. At the Woodrow Wilson Center in Washington, DC, she founded and directed the North Korea International Documentation project, which uncovers evidence on the history of North Korea from the archives of its former allies. She has served as consultant for several documentaries on the Korean War and North Korean history, and has taught courses on North Korea at the US-Korea Institute of the School of Advanced International Studies of The Johns Hopkins University. In 2014 the Ministry of Patriots and Veterans Affairs of the Republic of Korea honored her work on the Korean War by awarding her the Civilian Order of Merit.





PAUL CUNNINGHAM

Veteran

Paul was born and reared in Lancaster, PA. Upon graduation from high school in 1948, he enlisted in the U.S. Air Force. Shortly after completing his training as a radar repairman, the Korean war broke out, and by September 1950, he found himself in Korea. His duty stations included Pusan, Ulsan, Pyongtaek, and Kimpo.

Upon his discharge in 1953. Paul pursued a career in education. He began his career as a teacher of History and World Cultures. His entry into public school administration commenced when he was selected as Director of Curriculum in the district he was currently serving. Having already obtained a Masters, he returned to Temple University to pursue further graduate studies which led to the attainment of a Doctorate in educational administration. Paul subsequently served superintendencies in both New Jersey and Maryland. He retired in 1994.

In 2015, Paul was instrumental in establishing the Gen. John H. Michaelis chapter of the Korean War Veterans Association in Lancaster, PA. In 2016, he was elected to the Board of Directors of KWVA and two years later he was elected president of this national association.



JIM FISHER

Colonel

Colonel Fisher has served as the Executive Director of the Korean War Veterans Memorial Foundation since 2016. In 2001, he retired from the United States Army after over 24 years of service. He has served as the National Executive Director of the Korean War Veterans Association and Friends of the National WWII Memorial. One of his key assignments includes serving as the Director of Operations Officer for the Department of Defense's 50th Anniversary of WWII and 50 the Anniversary of the Korean War Commemoration. Additionally, he was the coordinating producer for the PBS National Memorial Day Concert and A Capitol Fourth Concert. In 2001, Colonel Fisher was awarded the Vietnam Veteran of the Year Award for his dedication to ensure all Veterans are properly honored for their service.



RACHEL COLLISHAW

President SSFNC

Rachel Collishaw is the founding president of the Social Studies Educators Network of Canada (SSENC) and the president of the Ontario History and Social Science Teachers' Association (OHASSTA). She has twenty years of experience as a secondary history teacher and instructional coach in Ottawa, Ontario. She has written textbooks, curriculum and other resources that use historical thinking concepts to support inquiry learning. She is a recipient of the 2013 Governor General's History Award for Excellence in Teaching for her work with historical thinking and remembrance. In her day job, she now designs civic education resources and professional learning for educators at Elections Canada.







DR. GREGG BRAZINSKY

Scholar

Dr. Brazinsky is a Professor of History and International Affairs at the Elliott School of International Affairs at The George Washington University in Washington, D.C. He is the author of two books: Winning the Third World (2017), which focuses on Sino-American Rivalry in the Third World and Nation Building in South Korea (2007), which explores U.S.-South Korean relations during the Cold War. He has received numerous fellowships to support his research including the Kluge Fellowship from the Library of Congress, the Smith Richardson Foundation junior faculty fellowship, and a fellowship from the Woodrow Wilson Center. Professor Brazinsky also currently serves as the Director of the George Washington Cold War Group.

JOHN H. TILELLI, JR.

General, U.S. Army (Ret.)

General Tilelli has been a member of Cypress International since 2002. In January 2000, he retired from the United States Army after over thirty years of service. He then became the President and CEO of USO Worldwide Operations. General Tilelli's last active duty assignment was Commander-in-Chief of the United Nations Command, Republic of Korea/United States Combined Forces Command/United States Forces Korea.

Key assignments include:

- Commanded the largest standing joint and coalition forces in the world comprising over 650,000 soldiers, sailors, airmen, and marines.
- Led the theater's campaign strategy and revitalized Korea's automated command and control and equipment modernization.
- Served as Vice Chief of Staff of the Army and the Army's Deputy Chief of Operations. Led the Army's vision of the Army of the 21st Century and implemented reforms in acquisition and procurement.
- Commander of the 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood, Texas. Trained, deployed and fought with the Division in Operation Desert Shield and Desert Storm.



LESSON PLAN

The Korean War Legacy Foundation invites conference participants to submit a creative and engaging lesson plan that focuses on the participants' respective country. The centerpiece of the KWLF collection is the curated, annotated library of nearly 1,500 oral histories, over 3,500 video clips, and over 1,800 photos centering on the Korean War and its legacy. Teachers are encouraged to submit a creative and engaging lesson plan that utilizes resources in the interview archive.

Lessons must engage students in the KWLF interview archive in some way. This could include using the archive to:

- Research topics related to the Korean War
- Reflect on the experiences of veterans and/or the legacy of the Korean War
- Compare and contrast veteran experiences
- Connect veteran experiences to other wars in history

Requirements

- This contest is only open to teachers who attended the 2021 KWLF World Congress.
- Lessons may be created for any social science/ history class.
- Ideas and sources may be used from any part of the conference. Teachers are encouraged to include sources from the KWLF website such as veterans' interviews.
- Lessons should be designed to take between 1-4 class periods (45 minutes each) and utilize our standard lesson template below.
- Lessons should be submitted in English as well as the native language.
- Only one entry per person is allowed.

Up to eight winners will receive:

- \$250 cash award
- Local press release recognizing the achievement



Mike Muller



BIO



Mike Muller was born in Johannesburg, South Africa in 1930. He was a career Air Force officer rising to the rank of Lieutenant-General. He served in the South African Airforce 2 Squadron nicknamed the Cheetah Squadron that formed part of the US Air Force 18th Fighter Bomber wing as a young 2nd Lieutenant. He flew 72 missions over Korea in missions ranging from close ground support to attacking enemy supply lines flying American F-51 Mustangs. He was shot down north of Pyongyang in the fall of 1951 but was quickly rescued by helicopter. Mike Muller remembers the comradery and gratitude of the Korean people fondly.
